on the chart might assist you in supporting your child's reading at home. It will also help your child remember what to do when faced with a "tricky" part in their reading at home! Ask your child to tell you about the chart! (They will not be able to read the whole thing, but we hope they'll be able to explain the "gist" of each item to you!)

Our latest **writing** has been the continuation of "How To" books and the introduction of "All About" books! We have been careful writers writing about informational topics and supplying facts about a particular topic. We are working on expanding our writing which means being able to write a complex sentence. We have begun the process of editing our writing by thinking about our writer's checklist.

We are beginning our study of **pushes and pulls** in science! The children will explore motion. "Pushes and Pulls" offers an introduction to physics. Students will participate in activities such as classifying "pushing and pulling" pictures, exploring pushing and pulling using a variety of techniques, determining which object requires more force to be pushed and moved across a finish line, and designing a playground where there are at least three pushes and three pulls. Students will also learn about **speed and direction**. They will explore speed and force by kicking a ball toward a target, discovering what happens when a moving ball collides with balls that are stationary, and problem-solving to determine how to move a toy car to the garage without pushing it. There will be a whole lot of moving going on!

In **math** we will continue to learn to make combinations that add up to ten, to measure, to weigh, and to compare lengths. We will also work more with attributes and with 2-dimensional and 3-dimensional shapes. Students will continue to practice addition and subtraction not only with manipulatives, but they will practice writing number stories accompanied by number models. Students will learn to use the calculator to practice skip counting. This is always a popular activity! **Many children are now able to count independently to 100 or more. Please practice counting with your child if they are not yet meeting this milestone.** In addition, many students are able to **identify the numerals 0-20** by this time in kindergarten. Please assist your child in identifying these numerals if they are not yet meeting this important benchmark.
